In the Northumberland and Durham Branch the five stewards have allocated nearly £1,200, together with sympathetic advice to several needy cases.

Obviously it is in the best interest of all members that this walk be well supported to ensure that the Fund continues to flourish.

Bill Cowley, a local farmer, issued a challenge in the Dalesman that he would present a cup to the first walkers who traversed the Yorkshire Moors from Osmotherly to Ravenscar. He was eventually forced to accept his own challenge and it was in the middle of Wheeldale Moor at 3.00 a.m. that the particular poignancy of this ancient Dirge hit the first party of walkers and the Walk was thus named. After this first crossing in October 1955 many thousands have followed in Bill Cowley's footsteps.
